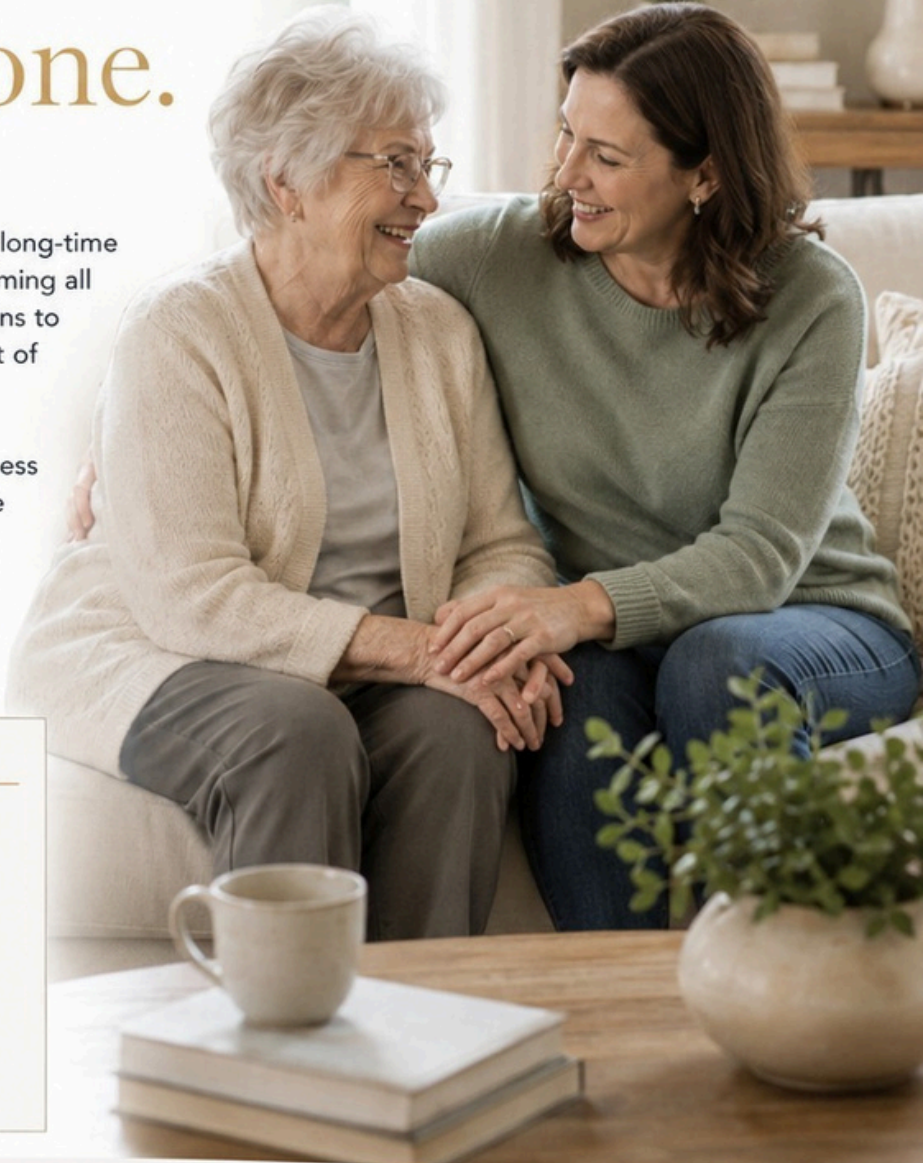
# You're Not Supposed To Know How To Do This Alone.

# A Family Home Transition Touches Everything.



It is rarely just one decision. It is many moving parts happening at once.



## Emotional weight

The home holds memories, identity, and family history.



## Many decisions

Care, timing, belongings, and housing options all compete for attention.



## Logistics and timelines

Cleanout, repairs, paperwork, and coordination take more time than most families expect.



## Family dynamics

Different opinions, schedules, and emotions can make progress feel harder.

## Signs it may be time to start planning

- Safety concerns at home are increasing
- Home upkeep feels like too much
- A recent health change has changed daily routines
- The family knows a move is coming, but no one knows how to begin
- Adult children are coordinating from a distance
- The home has become too large or too difficult to manage

# Leaving A Long-Time Home Is Never Just About The House.

For many families, this part is the hardest. A home can represent decades of routines, milestones, and memories. It can also bring guilt, grief, relief, and uncertainty all at the same time.

That mix of emotions is normal. A thoughtful transition makes space for the practical decisions while still honoring the life that happened there.

## A gentle approach

- Expect mixed emotions
- Make room for stories and memory sharing
- Decide who will help lead decisions
- Take photos of meaningful spaces and items
- Aim for progress, not perfection

# What Needs To Happen Next?

- **1 Clarify the goal**

Is the plan to stay longer, downsize, move, or prepare the home for a sale?
- **2 Gather key information**

Collect important contacts, legal and insurance information, utility details, and service records.
- **3 Walk the home**

Note safety issues, deferred maintenance, and what feels most urgent.
- **4 Build a realistic timeline**

Break the transition into manageable phases instead of trying to do everything at once.
- **5 Decide what to outsource**

Sorting, cleanout, vendor coordination, and prep work often move faster with support.

## What can usually wait

-  Major upgrades
-  Rushing to empty every room
-  Final decisions made before the family is ready

# Sort Gently. One Space At A Time.

Belongings are often the most time-consuming and emotional part of a family home transition. A simple system helps the process feel less overwhelming.

## THE FOUR-BIN METHOD



### Keep

Items needed now or clearly meaningful.



### Family

Pieces to share or pass along.



### Donate

Useful items that can help someone else.



### Sell or Recycle

Items that no longer fit the next chapter.

## HELPFUL TIPS

- Start with lower-emotion areas first
- Set aside papers, photos, and personal records early
- Create a 'decide later' zone
- Label boxes clearly
- Schedule donation pickups or removal dates
- Bring in help before burnout sets in

# Cleanout, Safety, Repairs, and Presentation.



## Home cleanout

Remove trash, expired items, duplicates, and anything that makes the home feel crowded or difficult to navigate.



## Safety first

Check trip hazards, lighting, railings, smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, leaks, locks, and general accessibility.



## Light repairs

Focus on practical updates like patching, touch-up paint, deep cleaning, and minor handyman items.



## Presentation

Depersonalize thoughtfully, keep a few useful furnishings, brighten the space, and help the home feel cared for.



Most families do not need a full renovation. Clean, safe, and well-presented often goes much farther than expensive upgrades.



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# Understanding The Family's Options



There is no one right answer. The right path depends on care needs, timing, finances, family goals, and the condition of the home.



## 1. Stay for now with support

The family adds support, services, or safety changes while deciding on longer-term plans.

**Best when:** A move is not immediate and staying a little longer is realistic.



## 2. Downsize or move to a better-fit setting

The next home may be smaller, simpler, safer, or offer more support.

**Best when:** Daily living is easier outside the current home.



## 3. Prepare the home for sale

The family creates a plan to sort, clean out, and get the property ready.

**Best when:** The home no longer fits current needs and a sale is the best next step.



## 4. Keep the home in the family or as a rental

Sometimes the property has long-term family or financial value.

**Best when:** Roles, responsibilities, and upkeep are clear.



A clear plan matters more than a rushed decision.
